**INTERIM CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER’S REPORT**

**AL NAIPO**

Staff Recommendation: **RECEIVE** and **FILE** the interim Chief administrative officer’s report.  
**Discussion and possible action** where indicated.

**A. Hearing Room and Commission Offices Renovation**

Preparation work for the renovation of the Hearing Room is set to begin April 30. Work is still underway to relocate the administrative offices of the Commission to the west side of the lobby with completion expected in 5-6 weeks. As a result, staff was notified by USC last week that it would be necessary to temporarily relocate Commission offices to a trailer on the Coliseum grounds until such time the new offices are ready. USC will share more details in its report at this meeting.

**B. Public Interest Event – Walk for Wishes (Make-A-Wish)**

The Walk for Wishes public interest event was held Saturday, April 7 with 1,500 people participating. Organizers report the fundraiser to grant wishes to critically ill children surpassed that of last year’s event. Despite Coliseum construction and a new layout for the walk, the event was regarded as a big success.

**C. Public Interest Event – Memorial Day Ceremony**

As approved by Commissioners in March, the Commission will host a Memorial Day Ceremony at the Coliseum’s Peristyle Plaza as a public interest event on Monday, May 28<sup>th</sup> at noon. Staff is working with USC and the World War I Centennial Commission to produce the one-hour event. At present, efforts are underway to secure a keynote speaker and other participants. The event is free and open to the public.

#### **D. World War I Memorial Grant & Designation**

As noted and acted upon at our March 22<sup>nd</sup> meeting, the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum received a national designation on April 5, 2018 as a World War I Centennial Memorial. That also included a \$2,000 grant for the restoration, conservation and maintenance of the memorial (see **Attachment 6.1**). The Commission may recall at its March meeting that members voted to accept the designation and grant prior to the announcement.

The 100 Cities Memorial group will also provide the Commission with a certificate of that national designation along with the opportunity to purchase an 8"x10" bronze plaque commemorating that designation at a cost of \$275 (see **Attachment 6.2**). Staff recommends the purchase and advises that the deadline to order is May 15<sup>th</sup>.

**Discussion and possible action to approve the purchase of a World War I memorial plaque.**

#### **E. Public Interest Event – Veterans Day Ceremony**

This year marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of the Armistice signaling an end to The Great War. Given the Coliseum's now national recognition as a WWI Memorial, staff is recommending that the Commission host a public interest event to honor both the fallen in that war and all those who served in the service of our country. At the Commission's next meeting, Staff will present a proposal for review and possible action regarding a ceremony.

#### **F. Los Angeles Football Club**

The Los Angeles Football Club held a ribbon cutting ceremony April 18<sup>th</sup> with Commissioners Price, Ridley-Thomas and alternate Pulido representing the Commission. The LAFC also held a public open house April 21 for its new Banc of California Stadium in advance of its first home game ever on Sunday April 29<sup>th</sup>. The LAFC will provide an update on the overall project at this meeting.

#### **G. Springsteen Court of Honor Plaque and Proposed Relocation**

The unveiling of the Bruce Springsteen and E Street Band Court of Honor Plaque (see **Attachment 6.3**) that is currently installed is on hold. Efforts to reach the honorees regarding their participation have been unsuccessful. Staff and USC are considering options to proceed without their participation.

At this time, staff is recommending that the Springsteen plaque be relocated to another location in the Court of Honor. The plaque's current location (see **Attachment 6.4**) is just north of the large arch in the middle of the Peristyle in close proximity to several plaques honoring individuals for their work regarding the Olympic Games.

Staff believes it would be more appropriate to relocate the Springsteen plaque (see **Attachment 6.5**) to an area closer to the former Sports Arena site for which the "Boss"

is being honored for his commitment and love of that once iconic arena. The cost for relocating the plaque is estimated at \$450, which would be borne by the Commission.

Staff recommends relocating the plaque at the time when the next Court of Honor plaque is to be installed, greatly reducing the cost of a separate installation.

#### **Discussion and possible action approving the relocation of the Springsteen plaque.**

#### **H. Disposition of Stored Sports Arena Items**

The Los Angeles Football Club has determined that it will not repurpose the items it currently is holding in storage from the former Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena (see **Attachment 6.6**). Staff has inspected and conducted an inventory of those items and determined that given the condition, size and lack of storage space, that the LAFC should properly dispose of those items.


#### **I. Former Coliseum Commissioner William Chadwick**

## U.S. World War One Centennial Commission and The Pritzker Military Museum and Library Announce the Final 50 "WWI CENTENNIAL MEMORIALS"

### Los Angeles' Memorial Coliseum, Chicago's Soldier Field, San Francisco's Opera Hall and Washington DC's Pershing Park Part of the Official 100 "WW1 Centennial Memorials"

**CHICAGO, IL, April 5** – On the eve of the 101st Anniversary of the United States entering World War I, the U.S. World War I Centennial Commission and the Pritzker Military Museum and Library announced today the final 50 WWI Centennial Memorials to be awarded grants and honored with the official national designation as "WW1 Centennial Memorials."

All 100 memorials, in all 100 cities have now been designated including such national landmarks as: Chicago's Soldier Field, LA's "Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum", San Francisco's "War Memorial Veterans Building and Opera House", Honolulu's "Natatorium" and Washington, D.C.'s "National World War I Memorial at Pershing Park". In addition, smaller local community projects are being recognized such as: Scranton Pennsylvania's "Col. Frank Duffy Memorial Bridge and Park", Cape May, New Jersey's "Soldier and Sailors Monument", Ocean Springs, Mississippi's "Emile WWI Memorial," and North Carolina's NC State University "Memorial Belltower", to name just a few. The newly-designated memorials are in 37 different states and each will receive a \$2,000 matching grant, towards the rest conservation and maintenance of these local historical treasures.

The 100 Cities / 100 Memorials program, sponsored by the US World War One Centennial Commission and the Pritzker Military Museum & Library with support from the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars have now awarded \$200,000 in matching grants and designated 100 memorials in 100 cities as official "WW1 Centennial Memorials."

"More than 4 million American families sent their sons and daughters to serve in uniform during World War I, 11 million U.S. soldiers died in the war and another 200,000 were wounded," said Terry Hamby, commissioner of the United States World War One Centennial Commission. "100 Cities/100 Memorials is a critically important initiative that will have an impact beyond these grants. These memorials represent an important part of remembering our past and preserving our culture."

"I am impressed by the community involvement that has sprung from this project," noted Dan Dayton, Executive Director of the U.S. World War One Centennial Commission. "By focusing on restoring these community treasures, local veterans groups, historical society and citizens have come together to remember the community's heritage - and that was really a key goal of the program."

Kenneth Clarke, former president and CEO of the Pritzker Military Museum and Library and the originator of the program, agreed. "By designating 100 WWI memorials across the nation, we believe the breadth and scope of this initiative will have a ripple effect beyond the 100 "WWI centennial memorials". By promoting renewed interest and focus on these monuments and memorials — as a nation, we honor the names of those who served and the history of the communities where they lived."

The profound impact of the war moved citizens in places across the United States to commemorate both the national and local sacrifices from the conflict through monuments, buildings, plaques, parks, groves, even roads and highways.

The 100 Cities/100 Memorials program was created to help draw attention to WWI memorials across the United States and enables all of America to take part in the WWI centennial commemoration. Many of these WWI memorials





## BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN AND THE E STREET BAND

SINCE THE MEMORIAL COLISEUM OPENED IN 1923, AND THE SPORTS ARENA IN 1959, NO OTHER PERFORMER HAS APPEARED MORE OFTEN, OR THRILLED MORE FANS THAN BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN AND THE E STREET BAND. FROM THE FIRST APPEARANCE IN 1980, TO THE 1985 BORN IN THE USA APPEARANCES, THROUGH TUNNEL OF LOVE EXPRESS, MAGIC AND WRECKING BALL TOURS, THE BAND HAS THRILLED THOUSANDS OF FANS WITH EVERY PERFORMANCE. FITTINGLY, BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN AND THE E STREET BAND CLOSED THE 57-YEAR OLD SPORTS ARENA WITH THREE SOLD OUT ROCK AND ROLL SHOWS IN MARCH 2016, SENDING THE "DUMP THAT JUMP" OUT IN STYLE.

IN ADDITION TO THE 39 LIVE PERFORMANCES, MANY OF THE LOS ANGELES APPEARANCES ARE NOTABLE AMONGST FANS FOR ONE REASON OR ANOTHER:

- THE AUGUST 20, 1981 PERFORMANCE DURING "THE RIVER" TOUR RAISED OVER \$100,000 AS A BENEFIT CONCERT FOR THE VIETNAM VETERANS OF AMERICA FOUNDATION AND MENTAL HEALTH FOUNDATION IN LOS ANGELES.

- A. Projects Requiring Coliseum Commission Approval (Those that materially affect the exterior structure or appearance of the Coliseum or Coliseum Property, or the historical significance of the Coliseum...or, are structural in nature...)
  - i. Coliseum Renovation Project, approved by the Commission July 28, 2016...
    - a. Work commencing January 8, 2018 and shall continue for approximately 18 months until July 2019.
    - b. Stadium impacted areas shall be south side of stadium from section 4 to section 10, the south yard level between Gates 4 and 11, and the Coliseum field. The building will have limited operations during the construction period.

- c. A temporary press box will be installed for the 2018 football season and the field cleared to host USC and Rams football games. Construction work will occur during a football game week Monday-Thursday, paused for the facility to host the weekend game, then resumed the following Monday.

While the construction will have a large impact on the stadium for 18 months, the stadium will still be able to host events on a limited scale, including the Coliseum Commission's eight designated Public Interest Events. The requirements for each event will be evaluated before final approval can be given; for example, if the set up and areas of use for the Memorial Day event and the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Celebration remain the same as in 2017, these events will be able to take place.





**COLISEUM NORTH SIDE CONCESSIONS UPGRADE and IMPROVEMENT PROJECT**

**March 28, 2018**

On the north side of the Coliseum at street level, there are 4 existing concession stands, 2 on either side of Gate 23. These stands were constructed in the late '70s or early '80s and are considerably inadequate by today's standards. All four stands are narrow, cramped, lacking proper cooking facilities and due to poor design, have only 24 points-of-sale between them. Our ability to serve an expanded menu of fresh food to as many customers as possible during the course of an event is limited. Please see **Images 1 – 5** of the existing conditions.

The improvement concept is to demolish the four existing buildings, and replace with two larger, modern structures that will allow for improved menu selections, faster transactions and double the number of the points-of-sale (48). Please see **Image 6** showing the location of where the two new structures would replace the four existing buildings and **Image 7** to see the new concept.

What allows us to have this work completed in time for the 2018 football season, is the structure is in two parts. The first part is the kitchen building, and the second part is the frontage, or façade. Both parts are pre-fabricated and constructed off-site, shipped to the Coliseum, and assembled in place; we are not constructing two new brick-and-mortar buildings requiring entitlements, plan check, etc. The company constructing off-site will be responsible for meeting all code and permit requirements.

The kitchen building is basically multiple storage containers welded together and equipped with the necessary kitchen equipment for the desired menu. This concept for example will allow us to go from a basic menu to one with more variety such as hot chicken sandwiches, chicken tenders and fries, pizza, meatball sandwiches, carne asada, bar-be-que pulled pork and hamburgers. For these kitchens to be outfitted, shipped and installed in time for the football season, we will need to make a financial commitment by April 1.

The frontage, or façade, gives us the opportunity to hide the kitchen building and create a special "look" to each concession stand. Please see **Images 8 - 10** as examples of some of the possible facades. As you can see, the façade style provides a much nicer culinary environment than what we currently offer. We have not decided upon the final frontage look yet and would like the opportunity to present the options to the Commission at a future meeting for review.



The kitchen structure also gives us the opportunity to incorporate a hospitality deck on the top of each structure if we choose, each with a capacity of approximately 200 people. We have previously managed to squeeze hospitality areas into different areas of the Coliseum and this allows us to add hospitality in areas of the stadium that were lacking services.

Access to the rooftop hospitality area during events will be determined by the organizer, and will vary event-to-event. During USC football games, consistent with the other controlled hospitality areas where alcohol is served, the deck would be accessible to members of the Trojan Athletic Fund.

At this point we have not decided upon whether a deck will be included in the project.

Please see **Image 11** for an example of the conceptual new concession stand with the rooftop hospitality option.

Finally, we believe these improvements to the north side concession stands may be a model we replicate in other areas of the stadium over time giving us the ability to replace all of the old, outdated and inadequate facilities with modern opportunities. The lifespan of the kitchen building is 30+ years, while the ability to replace just the façade when necessary, allows us to keep a modern and fresh look to the concession stands.




In accordance with Section 14.1 of the Second Amendment to the Lease and Agreement between the Commission and USC (Lease), please find attached annual report for the period July 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017. The annual report includes the following information:

- 1) Completed and planned events
- 2) Capital repair or improvement projects either underway or proposed in the following twelve-month period
- 3) Operating receipts, operating expenses, and capital improvement and repair cost reports in furtherance of the provisions of Section 4.3 (Cumulative Calculated Amount).

The following provides a summary overview of each section of the report.

**Summary of completed and planned events (page 1)**

**Completed and Planned Events (pages 2 – 6)**

For the period July 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017, there were 96 total completed event days at the Coliseum.

The total attendance during the reporting period is 1,201,528. Those events that achieved the highest levels of attendance were NFL Rams football home games, USC football home games, an international soccer match, FYF Festival and Camp Flog Gnaw.

In addition, there were 7 total community/religious event days including the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Festival, LA2028 Press conference and the Christmas Tree Giveaway.

Due to the ongoing construction activity at the Coliseum there are a limited number of planned events for the remainder of the fiscal year. There are currently 11 planned event days for the period January 1, 2018 through June 30, 2018. Notable planned events include:

- Rams Football, January 6
- Air & Style (2 days), March 3-4
- Make a Wish Walk, April 7

Capital Repair or Improvement Projects (page 7)

For the reporting period, \$9,315,580 was spent on capital improvement projects. These projects are Coliseum related upgrades.

Projects that meet the criteria of Schedule 11 projects are listed, and those projects considered potential Schedule 11 (Category 2) replacement projects are noted as well. The projects listed are only those that are considered capital expenditures as defined by generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP).

Operating Receipts, Operating Expenses, and Capital Improvements (page 8)

In accordance with Section 4.3 of the Lease, the Cumulative Calculated Amount (CCA) elements for the semi-annual reporting period are as follows:

Staff has reviewed the design and recommends Commission approval to move forward with the plaque.





**Overview:**
